4. Scheduling changes.

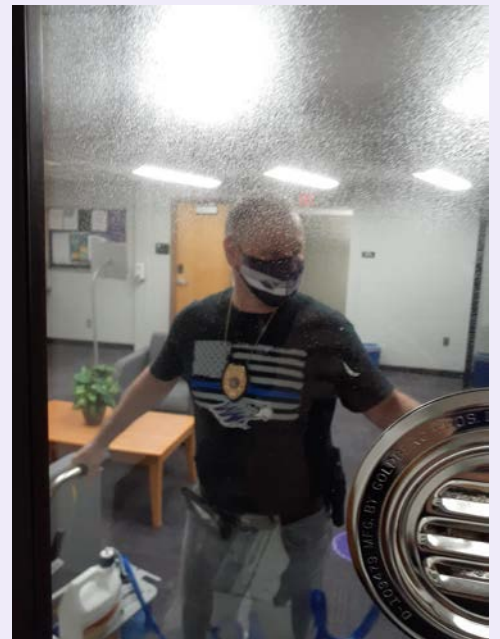

UWWPD KEEPS YOU SAFE!



FUN FACTS: In the first two weeks of February, UWWPD had over **60** calls to jumpstart vehicles on campus.

Tips to start your car in cold weather:

1. Turn off everything (radio, heater, defroster, headlights and windshield wipers) to let your battery focus on starting your vehicle.
2. Turn the key and hold it for about 10 seconds. If it doesn't start, let it rest a few minutes and try again.
3. If it doesn't start after a few tries, jumping the battery may help, but depending on the age of the battery a replacement might be necessary.

Reminder: UWWPD offers this service for free, but emergency/urgent calls take priority. **Additionally, jumpstart services are only offered on campus.**

CPR PROGRAM UPDATES:

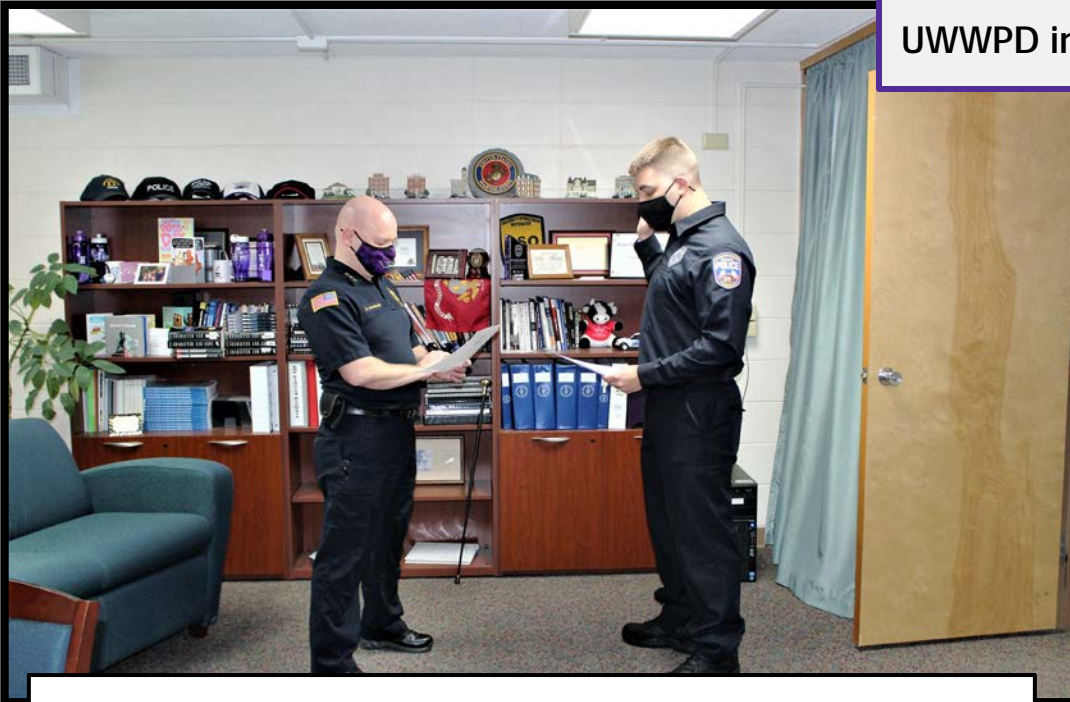
Despite the COVID-19 Pandemic, UWWPD continues to safely certify students and employees of UW-Whitewater in CPR and AED usage. This service is free of charge.
