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Guiding the Future:

A Message from Chancellor Corey A King



Dear alumni and friends of UW-Whitewater,

I am now several months into my third year as chancellor, and I can say I have never been prouder to be part of the Warhawk family.

Across our Whitewater and Rock County campuses, we are engaged in the important work of transforming lives. Under the

mentorship of our faculty and staff, our Warhawk students are thriving, learning and achieving. I encourage you to check out our news site at uww.edu/news to read more about all the good things happening here.

I'd like to take this opportunity to provide a few updates:

- ENROLLMENT AND RETENTION. Enrollment for this past fall was 11,752, the largest at the university in four years. We retained 78 percent of our 2023-24 cohort. Our goal is to achieve enrollment of 13,000 students which would be a record for UW-Whitewater and to reach a retention rate of 82 percent.
- BUDGET. Due to our focus on increasing enrollment, increasing retention and continuous improvement, we're on our way to eliminating our budget structural deficit by fiscal year 2025-26. This reflects outstanding work by the Chancellor's Cabinet and the Strategic Planning and Budget Committee, which includes faculty, staff and shared governance leaders.
- BUDGET ADVOCACY. Under the leadership of President Rothman and our colleagues at the Universities of Wisconsin, we're navigating the next state budget cycle. Wisconsin currently ranks 44th out of 50 states for the funding of its public universities. This level of underfunding jeopardizes the quality of and access to education that students deserve and parents and families expect. We recently conducted research that shows UW-Whitewater and our alumni contribute more than \$1.4 billion dollars to Wisconsin's economy each year. I have communicated with the governor and key legislators that it is time for UW-Whitewater to receive the appropriate funding levels to continue to advance our mission and core values toward student success.



► FEDERAL LANDSCAPE. The new presidential administration has signed several executive orders and personnel actions with potential impacts across higher education. UW-Whitewater and the Universities of Wisconsin are closely monitoring these developments to assess their implications for the educational, service and access missions of our campuses. As a community, we remain committed to addressing these changes thoughtfully, within the bounds of the law, and in alignment with our mission and core values.

FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN.

In June, we will launch the largest fundraising campaign in our university's history. "Our Stories. Our Future: A Campaign for UW-Whitewater" will seek to raise at least

Giving Forward:

Tom Smith's Return to UW-Whitewater and a Legacy of Generosity

When Tom Smith walked onto the UW-Whitewater campus last fall for the first time in more than 50 years, it was more than a nostalgic visit. It was a homecoming — and the next step in a generous, ongoing commitment to students following in his footsteps.

Tom, who earned his BBA in accounting in 1970 and M.S. in 1971, is the founder of the Thomas A. Smith Accounting Scholarship, established in 2021. His mission? To give forward — a value he holds deeply after receiving scholarships that helped make his own education possible.

During his time at UWW, Tom was a student leader, athlete, and fraternity officer. After graduation, he launched a successful career in public and private accounting, eventually becoming an independent CPA and international consultant. Despite moving to cities across the country — and building a remarkable career — his connection to Whitewater remained strong.

Tom's return visit in September 2024, accompanied by his wife, Ronnie Lidstone, was packed with meaningful moments. They toured the beautifully transformed campus, met with current scholarship recipients, and shared stories over dinner with Chancellor Corey A. King and faculty leaders. "Tom could've talked with the students for hours," one colleague remarked — and it's clear that the spark of mentorship still burns bright.

What made the visit even more special was Ronnie's involvement. A successful CPA herself and a Cornell University graduate, Ronnie also chose to support UW-Whitewater, making a personal gift to the Foundation. Her curiosity about campus life and sincere interest in our students' experiences made a lasting impression. We look forward to seeing her voice reflected in future initiatives.

Currently, the Smith Scholarship supports four awards annually for accounting majors who demonstrate leadership and community engagement. During the visit, Tom expressed a desire to expand the program to five recipients per semester, and increase the financial award— a remarkable vision for even broader impact.

At the conclusion of their visit, Chancellor King presented Tom with a Chancellor's pin in honor of his contributions. The gesture, though small, clearly meant a lot to Tom — a man whose generosity is rooted in gratitude and a deep belief in what UW-Whitewater can offer.

A Benson Hall Sisterhood of 50 Years:

Honoring A Friend, Inspiring Future Teachers

n the fall of 1969, six young women arrived at UW-Whitewater, their suitcases in hand and hearts full of hope. As freshmen living in Benson Hall, they quickly became more than roommates — they became lifelong friends. Over the decades, through weddings, careers, raising children, and the heartache of loss, their bond has never faltered.

For more than 50 years, this remarkable sisterhood has gathered every year without fail. They've seen each other through life's milestones always with love, laughter, and unwavering support. In 1998, the group faced one of their greatest heartbreaks: the passing of their beloved friend and roommate, Laurie Couzens Swartz, a 1973 grad with a degree in elementary education. Laurie, left behind a legacy of compassion and dedication to elementary education, along with her young son and husband.

As the sisterhood celebrated the golden anniversary of their friendship, Diane Green Pillard, who built her career in higher education, proposed an idea that would honor Laurie and give back to the university. Why not create a scholarship in Laurie's memory — a tribute not only to her but to their enduring friendship? Moved by the idea, Diane, Jan Schlueter Lasky, Vikee Sykes Loudon, and Maggie Bromley established a one-time scholarship for a UW-Whitewater student pursuing a career in teaching. Last November, at the College of Education and Professional Studies' scholarship event, they gathered alongside Laurie's husband, Chris, and son, Kyle, who also contributed to this scholarship, to meet the first recipient: Emma Bergeson.

From the moment they met Emma, the women were captivated. A Fond Farewell to the Current Winther Hall—

And a Bold Step Into the Future

For nearly 160 years, the roots of UW-Whitewater's College of Education and Professional Studies have been deeply woven into the fabric of campus life, impacting more than 24 million lives across generations. Today, the College proudly holds the title of producing the most educators in the State of Wisconsin. Now, as we are preparing to say farewell to the current Winther Hall as we know it, we also look ahead with excitement to a BOLD new future.

On February 22, 2025, the Wisconsin State Legislature approved the final budget of just over \$89 million as part of the state's capital budget bill, which was signed into law by Governor Tony Evers on March 6, 2025. This historic investment sets the stage for the complete renovation of Winther Hall, beginning in April 2026 and concluding in Spring 2029.

The new Winther Hall will be nothing short of transformational:

- Expansive large windows and abundant natural light
- Two new elevators for improved accessibility
- A welcoming Student Services Center on the main floor
- Spacious, modern bathrooms on every floor
- and many other improvements designed to meet the needs of today's and tomorrow's students.

UNITED IN WARHAWK ATHLETICS: A Year of Strength, Success, and Spirit

The 2024-25 academic year was a testament to the strength, perseverance, and unity of the UW-Whitewater athletic community. In a year that began with unimaginable heartbreak, Warhawk student-athletes, coaches, administrators, and supporters came together to honor, uplift, and achieve — embodying the true spirit of the Warhawk family.

The Warhawk community faced profound sorrow with the unexpected loss of Kara Welsh, a beloved member of the gymnastics program, just prior to the start of the academic year. Despite the loss, UW-Whitewater held true to its tradition of excellence with remarkable success across many sports.



The fall semester brought a wave of historic accomplishments. Christian Patzka etched his name into the UW-Whitewater record books, becoming the first individual national champion in men's cross country history. He led the team to its best-ever national finish — fourth at the NCAA Division III Championships. The Warhawk volleyball team surged to the national championship match, finishing as the national runner-up.

During the winter season, the Warhawk women's gymnastics team honored Kara Welsh in the most profound way — by persevering through a season filled with



emotion and finishing as the national runner-up. Paige Magel and Tegan Haberstock shared the individual national title on the balance beam, showcasing excellence and grace under pressure.

The women's basketball program captured its fourth WIAC Tournament championship and extended its streak of NCAA Tournament appearances to nine with a run to the Sweet 16. Senior standout Kacie Carollo capped her decorated career as a finalist for National Player of the Year, cementing her place among the conference's all-time greats. This season the UW-Whitewater wrestling team qualified four athletes for the NCAA Championships.

Meanwhile, the Warhawk women's bowling program added to its tradition of excellence by qualifying for the Intercollegiate Team Championships. Jordyn Norvell also competed at the Intercollegiate Singles Championships. Track and field continued its national presence, sending 10 student-athletes to the NCAA Division III Indoor Championships.

Spring sports have carried the torch of success forward. Coming off a national runner-up finish in 2024, Warhawk Baseball earned another trip to the 2025 NCAA Division III World Series. Softball continues to impress on the national stage while proudly representing UW-Whitewater in its 25th NCAA Tournament appearance this season. The Warhawk men's and women's tennis programs also made return trips to the national tournaments.

As we close the chapter on an unforgettable year, we celebrate more than wins and titles — we honor the heart, character, and commitment that define Warhawk Athletics. From adversity came strength. From sorrow rose determination. And through it all, UW-Whitewater stood united — together, as Warhawks.

UW-Whitewater Founders Day Award Recipients 2025

Seven individuals who have achieved exceptional professional success or have made significant contributions to the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater are being honored as the university proudly celebrates its 157th anniversary. The 2025 class of award honorees include graduates with job responsibilities as diverse as managing grizzlies in a national park to playing a purple trombone in extreme conditions to coaching an NFL team — all reflecting the spirit of Warhawk Boldness and a culture of philanthropy that characterize the campus culture at UW-Whitewater.

The awards were presented at the Founders Day Celebration, held at UW-Whitewater on Saturday, April 26, 2025.



This year the university is honoring the professional achievements of two outstanding recent alumni. **Tyler Brasington**, who earned a B.S. in environmental science in 2017, has been serving as a bear management ranger

with the National Park Service at Grand Teton in Wyoming since 2019. **Dr. Sylvia Washington**, who earned a B.S. in sociology and criminal justice in 2016 and an M.S. in professional development and higher education leadership in 2017, serves as the director of DEI and partnerships at the Johns Hopkins Center for Gun Violence Solutions in Baltimore, Maryland.



UW-Whitewater is also honoring two distinguished alumni for their professional achievement. **Eric Studesville**, who earned a BSE in physical education in 1989, is associate head coach and running backs coach with the Miami Dolphins. His professional football coaching career includes a number of positions with collegiate teams, quality control coaching with

the Chicago Bears, and stints as running back coach with the New York Giants from 2001-2003, the Buffalo Bills from 2004-2009 and the Denver Broncos from 2010-2017. Studesville describes former head coach Bob Berezowitz and former defensive coordinator Bruce Bukowski as mentors who meaningfully shaped his time on campus and his ability to forge meaningful, long-lasting relationships with the players he coaches.



Also receiving the Distinguished Alumni Award for Professional Achievement is **Lisa Werner**. Werner, who earned her B.M. in music education-instrumental in 2001, is music teacher and band director at St. Bruno Parish School in Dousman and as the senior symphony orchestra manager with the Milwaukee Youth Symphony Orchestra organization. In order to show her

students that music is connected to everything, she has participated in unique interdisciplinary learning programs that have taken her — and her purple plastic trombone — into zero gravity, out to sea to conduct research, to Antarctica to engage in music-related activities often inspired by her students, and, later this year, to Africa on a Fulbright.



Jeff Angileri is this year's recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award for Service to UW-Whitewater. After earning a B.A in journalism in 2006, Angileri worked as a broadcast journalist for several years and then returned to campus, where he serves as executive director of University Marketing and Communications. Angileri has used his communication

and marketing talents to champion UW-Whitewater during its greatest triumphs and achievements and to serve as a rock of stability and strength during the university's most challenging times. A student speaker at his own graduation, he has mentored 35 student commencement speakers as well as supervising dozens of student interns. He meaningfully contributed to the university's 150th celebration by serving as host of the gala event and authoring the book created to honor the occasion. And as the recipient of college scholarships who experienced first hand the impact of philanthropy, he donates annually to the Warhawks Give and Giving Tuesday fundraisers.



The recipients of the S.A. White Award for Contributions to UW-Whitewater are **Dick and Roni Telfer**. The Telfers have made an imprint on the campus and the surrounding community in numerous ways. Dick Telfer provided 30 years of professional service to UW-Whitewater, culminating in his role as chancellor from 2007 to 2015. Roni Telfer's contributions

in education encompassed leadership roles in the community, including serving as co-president of the Whitewater Community Foundation, and an instructional technology position with UW-Whitewater. At UW-Whitewater the couple established the Richard and Veronica Telfer Fellowship Program and the Telfer Incentive Program and have provided financial support to numerous programs at UW-Whitewater, including the College of Education and Professional Studies, the College of Arts and Communication and the Young Auditorium, Hyland Hall, Athletics, and Wheelchair Basketball, programs that ardently supported while in their campus roles.

Waves of Impact: 61 Years of WSUW-FM

A t exactly 5:30 p.m. on January 10, 1964, three students and a faculty member at UW-Whitewater took over the 97.1 megahertz frequency to officially launch the WSUW-FM campus radio station. Little did they know that 61 years later, the station would still be going strong — shaping the lives of thousands of students and community members.



Humble Beginnings

One of the station's founders, Richard "Skip" Lubenow '65, was approached by Professor Sederholm, an English faculty member who knew Skip had experience working at a local radio station. Sederholm had an idea: start a campus station to "expand the popularity of the college by informing the community about the college through radio."

In the early days, WSUW-FM broadcast school updates and the popular music of the time. But it soon became more than just a bulletin board — it became a way for students to understand and share ideas, and to connect with each other's lives.

The station's popularity skyrocketed. By June 1968, its power was boosted from 10 watts which reached a 12-mile radius to 250 watts. This expanded its signal to listeners as far away as Beloit, Delavan, and Oconomowoc.

Lubenow reflected on how the experience shaped him personally. "I used to stutter, but the moment I got on air, I stopped stuttering. Working at the station changed my life because I was able to communicate and share my ideas more clearly." He credits the station with giving him tools that later helped him develop and uplift others in his various careers.

Global Proportions

As the station grew in the 1970s, Edward Hung '77, an international student from Hong Kong, hosted East Meets West and The Voice of Hong Kong, delivering Cantonese news and partnering with Hong Kong Commercial Broadcasting to send student greetings home — a global bridge long before the internet.

According to Logan Waller, current senior and Program Director, "I'd say the station is better than ever — we're making upgrades, updating broadcasting equipment, welcoming floods of new students, and finding creative new ideas for shows."

WSUW now runs 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. About 30 students

work at the station, producing around 25 specialty shows covering diverse music genres, sports, news, and more. Popular programs include Hawk Talk, The Ryan Hoke Show, and For the Record.

Reflections Across Time

Reflecting on how a small idea from the 1960s had blossomed into something with lasting positive impact on students, alumni, the community, and the world, Skip shared "This conversation helped me see that my purpose of helping people has been fulfilled."
