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Celebrating 40 Years of Lifelong Learning

Since 1983, UW-Whitewater faculty and staff have presented public lectures and led community conversations.

Once dubbed "one of Whitewater's best kept secrets," the Fairhaven Lecture Series has become a well-known tradition, engaging our community and transforming lives. This fall kicks off 40 years of the Series, showcasing some of UWW's award-winning faculty, staff, and programs in nine free lectures, open to all.

Lectures are held at 3pm on Monday afternoons at Fairhaven Senior Services, just east of campus. "The partnership we have with Fairhaven allows us to bring the Wisconsin Idea to life by sharing the expertise of our faculty with the greater Whitewater community," says Matt Vick, dean of the School of Graduate Studies and Continuing Education. To date, more than 400 presenters have led nearly 900 conversations with an estimated 18,000+ attendees in the four decades the Series has been held.

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Summer Camps Break Participation Records

UW-Whitewater hosted the most youth campers in its 50-year history!

Summer camps have been a vital part of UW-Whitewater's history since 1973, and in its 50th year, we set record-setting participation. More than 6,740 people participated in UWW's summer camps and clinics, breaking the previous record set

in 2015. In addition to those participating in its homegrown athletic, arts, and STEM programs, more than 7,000 additional people experienced the UWW campus through partner events, such as Special Olympics State Summer Games and Madison Scouts Marching Band.

Several camps had record participation in 2023 including <u>Football</u> (2,031), <u>Volleyball</u> (1,051), <u>Boys Basketball</u> (155), <u>Boys High School Soccer</u> (80), <u>Jazz</u> (49), and <u>Game Development</u> (45). Many other popular camps returned with high registration numbers including <u>Tennis</u>, <u>Band</u>, <u>Gymnastics</u>, and <u>College for Kids</u>. <u>Grandchildren's University</u> returned for the first time since the pandemic and new camps were added, including <u>Rock</u>, <u>Pop</u>, and <u>Music Production</u> in Whitewater and <u>Music Explorers</u> on the Rock campus.





Inclusivity and belonging are part of the priority mission of UW-Whitewater. Summer camps put the mission into practice by providing events like Wheelchair Basketball camp, hosted by national champion teams, and Chatter Matters, a camp serving individuals who use assistive communication devices and their families. In addition, UWW maintains a 1:10 ratio of camp staff to camper for all youth programming and prides itself in youth protection training for all faculty, staff, coaches, and volunteers involved in leading programming.

"UW-Whitewater has built a reputation of offering exceptional programming, in state-of-the-art facilities, at affordable prices,"

says Morgan Anderson, Director, <u>Camps & Conferences</u>. "Camps offer spaces for kids to be kids, disconnect from devices and reconnect with activities they love. Through camps, youth are developing life skills that will serve them well, long after camp is over."

Registration for some of the most popular camps begins in November with all camps registration open in January. Music, athletic, and academic events for youth are also held throughout the academic year. Visit our website for more information.



Program Spotlight: Partners in Education

UW-High school students earn college credit for a reduced cost while still in high school.

Partners in Education (PIE) is UW-Whitewater's dual enrollment program which connects high school students to UWW curriculum, building a pathway for successful transition to college. Students enroll in PIE designated courses, which are taught in the supportive context of their high schools by district faculty who meet UWW requirements as instructors. The syllabus, assignments, and requirements for the course are identical to those taught at UWW, and the credit earned appears on an official UWW transcript. Credit can count towards a future degree at UWW, or be transferred to another accredited university.

Since 2012, UWW has partnered with dozens of school districts around the state to offer coursework to thousands of students. UWW has had long standing partnerships with Whitewater, Wilmot, and Kettle Moraine school districts, and has welcomed many more in the past decade, including Cambria-Friesland, Cedarburg, West Bend and Brookfield Central this year. Many introductory courses in disciplines like chemistry, communication, and computer science are available to students, along with courses on creative writing, math, and political science. New this year are courses in biology and Spanish, as well as online offerings in accounting, communication sciences and disorders, and health offered to high schoolers across the state. An average of 200 students enroll in PIE courses each semester.

College Credit earned in this classroom

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"Students get an opportunity to jump start their college careers with the PIE program," says coordinator Stacie Collins.

"Classes give them the experience and confidence to see themselves in the college classroom in the future." PIE also provides valuable professional development for the high school teachers leading the courses. "PIE teachers work closely with their UWW mentor to ensure that content is college-level and they are offered a professional development opportunity at the end of each school year," says Collins. "It's a really valuable experience for students, teachers, and faculty alike."

Welcome Back, Adult Student Outreach and Community-Based Learning

SGSCE welcomes back Adult Student Outreach (ASO) and Community-Based Learning (CBL) to the unit this fall.

Led by Lauren Smith, director and Kevin DeCoux student services coordinator, ASO provides resources and support for prospective and current students who are over 25, returning to college, parents, military service members or who otherwise have needs that differ from those of traditional age college students.

The CBL program connects UW-Whitewater faculty with community partners to engage students in service learning and community-based research. Led by Jodie Parys, CBL fosters a campus community that is characterized by inclusive excellence for all students at UWW.

"The work of our unit extends beyond the classroom and we serve many stakeholders outside the traditional undergraduate student," says dean Matt Vick. "We look forward to working with ASO and CBL to increase the impact of SGSCE."
