Journals have been kept for centuries, and the research of BL Seaward (2020) discusses how journal writing gives voice to everyday experiences and can be used as a tool to manage stress. Implementing strategies that help students build a strong sense of belonging with inclusivity and civil discourse is heavy work. Additionally, journaling can promote critical self-reflection where problems might arise and evolving worldviews and contradictions are challenged. Self-awareness is vital in the work of teachers because it is the teachers beliefs and biases that influence how they connect with and also learn from their students and their families. This presentation will require participants to reflect deeply on their own identity, culture and bias. Throughout this session participants will develop understanding of the importance of culturally responsive teaching in early childhood education, the research and theory behind it. What they learn about themselves and others from classroom experiences help develop attitudes and values about fairness, justice and acceptance that will follow them throughout their lives.

401. Joyful Noise: Enriching Early Education with Music

403. Raise Educators Wages, Lower Turnover and Increase Quality through Scale: A Secret to Greater Success

Our Early Childhood Education field is in crisis. One of the main reasons for this crisis is that our educators are usually paid very low wages. The average wage in WI is around \$15 an hour. That's just not competitive in today's world. As a result, many great educators have left the field. How can we change this trend and reestablish a skilled and well compensated workforce? This presentation is about "economies of scale". As schools get larger, some expenses do not grow linearly with income. That produces extra margin which can be used in several ways, one of which is raising educator wages. See models of how this can work in different sized schools with different tuition rates, wages and staffing. Let's discuss the advantages and challenges of using this strategy to strengthen your school's economic system and how this strategy could potentially be used to solve the EC workforce shortage in about 75% of WI communities. **Adults**
