

Overview

The course is an undergraduate and graduate-level international travel study in which students will explore the historical development and current dimensions of chari-table nonprofit organizations in the UK and in the US. Students will identify similar organizations in each country and compare them across multiple key facets. Students will also consider differences and similarities in social and cultural contexts that might contribute to the expression of nonprofits in both countries.

Course Objectives:

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be expected to:

- Demonstrate understanding of national cultures and organizational culture
- Identify and analyze charitable organizations within the fields of higher education, human services, health, and arts and culture
- Discuss key operational and contextual aspects of charitable organizations within the fields of higher education, human services, health, and arts and culture
- Evaluate differences and similarities in one charitable field across national cultures
- Practice cross-cultural understanding in direct interpersonal interactions
- Recognize learning opportunities through regular reflection practice
